CHAPTER UPDATE

Beta Rho Brotherhood Remains Strong Through COVID

The coronavirus pandemic has changed the way we conduct our daily lives, and the same is true for our undergraduates. Many of our alumni brothers have asked how life at Beta Rho has been impacted, so we reached out to Chapter Eminent Commander **Nicholas Rivera '21** for the answers!

How is day-to-day life in the house different this year from previous years? What safety precautions are the brothers taking?

"The largest change has been reducing the use of common spaces. While brothers usually like to congregate in the chapter room to watch a game or the dining room to eat, it's

not safe to do this at this time. Brothers have been extra careful to wash their hands, reduce visits from people not living in the house, and monitor their symptoms. Even with these changes in place, brothers are still taking the time to try to be social with each other while remaining socially distant."

How did this fall's rush process differ from past years?

"Even more than previous years, this process involved leveraging already established networks to determine a potential market. In the name of safety, we focused on smaller and more personal conversations and events with students to try to get to know them best."

"One of my largest commitments outside of Greek life is Kite and Key, Penn's student tour guide organization. We have had to overhaul the process and are now going virtual, changing regular on-campus tours to Zoom informational sessions. Most activities and clubs have gone this way, and it has required a huge effort by leaders and members alike. There are plenty of activities on campus that continue to thrive despite the pandemic."

Why did you decide to pledge at Beta Rho? What drew you to the brotherhood?

"I am originally from Grosse Pointe, Michigan. As a senior in high school,

I knew I wanted to do something related to business and sought out the place that would best allow me to do that. Coming to Penn I didn't think of joining Greek life. 


